On December 8, 1941 he married Reba Johnston in Clinton, Oklahoma. He joined the United States Air Force during WWII where he served in North Africa. After being honorably discharged Alfred moved to Memorial Wells, Texas and then on to Kelso, Washington where he went to work for Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company. He helped them set up new plants in Borneo, Australia and Valient, Oklahoma. Alfred retired after 40 years of working as a millwright. He loved raising his garden and tending to his beautiful yard. Alfred planted two beautiful redwood trees in his well kept yard. He also enjoyed canning fruits and vegetables. What he loved most was to use his master craftsman skills, which showed through the hard work of renovating an old farm house into a very nice home. For the last six years Alfred was a resident here in Newberg. On Monday, December 12, 2011, Alfred J. Scrivner died at a local care facility when he was eighty-eight years, six months and seven days of age. Surviving and left to honor his life are: His son Alfred J.
